ered a public water system? (see box). Specifically, it is classified as an Other Than Municipal/Non-Community, Non-Transient (OTM/NN) public water system. This is because it serves 25 or more of the same people for more than 30 days.

Our OTM/NN system is required to have a licensed operator, respond to any reporting and inspection requests from the DNR, and to perform various water sampling testing quarterly and annually - ranging in price from free to nearly \$2,000. We have received several cost saving waivers over the years due to our particular cir-
